His former house in Hoylake backed onto the course and his widow Elspeth informs me that although he had been unwell for some time he very much enjoyed his 90th birthday party at the club. He was also a keen follower of Country Pursuits, being himself a good shot and organising shoots involving Tony Waugh, George Sidebotham, Mick Taylor and Don Lowe. He was also a keen fisherman of salmon and trout, sometimes in Scotland and other times on Tony Waugh's trout pool. He wasn't

Jeremy Walters on Crime

Jeremy gave us an edifying talk on crime in Victorian Wolverhampton. The list of misdemeanours was familiar : theft, prostitution, pickpocketing, illegal gambling (cock fighting etc), drunkenness, violence, murder. One of Jack the Ripper's victims was a Wolverhampton girl – but murder was not a very frequent crime. Prostitution was a scourge with 40 brothels in the town in 1872 and links with criminality. The Irish quarter near present-day Carvers accounted for a lot of drunkenness and crowd misbehaviour. One of the common

sanctions was transportation to Australia, even for minor thefts, until this was ended in 1853. A surprise in Jeremy's list was the crime of adulteration, water added to milk, sand added to sugar, acorns added to coffee etc. This may well have contributed to typhoid epidemics e,g in 1873. Sir Robert Peel set up the police force in London in 1829 and Wolverhampton had a police force of 12 in 1837 – but the population was 30 000! Jeremy produced the term thimble rigger and President Paul consulted his smart phone to find that it referred to the 'three cup trick' – and took the opportunity to chastise Jeremy for being an IT Luddite! All good fun and better than Brexit! SW



Send a Cow

Ian Bell came to talk to us about this charity founded in 1988. At that time Uganda was in a bad way and Europe had a butter mountain and a milk lake. Some Christian farmers had the idea of sending a batch of cows to help out - and so it began. They operate in Burundi, Ethiopia, Kenya, Rwanda, Uganda and Zambia and they no longer send surplus British cows but they help the Africans to help themselves – by ' hand- ups' not hand-outs . Since 1988 they have lifted more than two million out of poverty and the latest drive is Watering the Future by capping springs, capturing rainwater and

setting up regional water committees. In the very dry part of western Kenya where they have begun there are nearly 2000 vulnerable families. As Alan Jacques said when thanking Ian for his talk : a marvellous project.
