



PROSTHETIC HANDS

When industrial designer Ernie Meadows and his wife Marj lost their 18 year old daughter Ellen in a car accident, Ernie decided to create a legacy her memory. He developed a design for a low cost. light, durable and functional prosthetic hand. In 2006 Ernie gave the hand to Rotarian friends, specifying that no one should profit from the production and distribution, and that no recipient should be charged. Rotary clubs, particularly those in Rotary District 5160, northern California, along with many others, funded the production of the hands which have been distributed throughout the world.

The hands are donated free of charge by the Ellen Meadows Prosthetic Hand Foundation to Rotary Jaipur Limb. Now, many thousands of the hands have been produced, distributed and fitted at limb camps in India and Africa. They are also used in Colombia, Ecuador, Vietnam, Jordan and more. One such camp took place on Sunday, June 10th 2018 at The Government High School, Atibele, Anekal Taluk, 25 kms south of Bangalore, Southern India, and was attended by RJL Wolverhampton club member PDG Richard Green.

The camp was jointly organised by the Rotary Clubs of Bangalore Peenya, Hosur, Bangalore Spandana and Atibele-Sarjapura in Districts 3190 and 2982, under the exemplary leadership of Rotarian Mohan Kumar and with the help of Rotaractors and Interactors from the school. This was the 17th such camp Mohan had organised, and many more are planned. 86 men women and children received the LN4 hand at Atibele. These included Lavanya Prasanna.

Prasanna had lost her left hand and lower arm 9 years following electric shock – the cause of 80% of amputations in India, the others being railway, industrial and farm accidents. Hands are also fitted in cases of congenital deformity. In just 45 minutes, Prasanna, after travelling for 8 hours with her husband, had been assessed, measured and fitted with the new hand and given her first lesson in its use. The fittings were carried out by Prosthetist and Orthotist Doctor Chandani Korat who had flown many miles to give her services free of charge. The many Rotarians and other volunteers worked tirelessly through the whole day carrying out registrations, assessments, training and providing meals for the attendees and their families. Like so many of the people who were fitted with the LN4 hand, Prasanna smiled with joy as she received her new hand and said 'Thank You Rotary.' Richard Green.

I invited the head boy and girl of the school to help me to unveil the plaque and then President Savitha Suresh of the Peenya club and I duly cut the ribbon at the entrance door.



When the building work has been completed in all 6 schools it is estimated that we will have improved the well being and the quality of school life for over 2500 children. RG
