

A Perilous Situation

After a muted Christmas and New Year on 6th January the whole UK is in lockdown and schools are closed to save the NHS – more problems for Chancellor Rishi Sunak There are more than 30 000 in hospital and 60 000 new Corona cases each day, the average daily death rate is 685 and the total deaths 77 346. Well over 1 million have been vaccinated, with AstraZeneca/Oxford now rolling out beside Pfizer/ BioNTech, but there is also talk of variants being differently resistant to vaccines! It is intended to vaccinate 13 million people in 6 weeks – a tall order. Most of Europe appears to be in the same boat – at least EU members have ratified, as we have, the Brexit deal. There is complete silence on the China front – what are they up to apart from making arrests in Hong Kong? There have now been some 300 000 deaths in the USA, but today's problem is a Trump-incited storming of the Capitol as Congress formally registers Joe Biden's victory.

Club Meeting by Zoom on 12th January 2021

Richard Green has done a couple more Two Ronnies gigs, the Samaritans fundraising via the signed Wolves shirt is going well and the Christmas Appeal 'surplus' will be added to the Small Grants Scheme. President Brian reported briefly on yesterday's Governing Council : the new Cosford CO will hopefully be persuaded to come and talk to us, Tim Dukes has suggested a music/orchestra focus for his father's legacy to the club, charitable giving is receiving a rethink and Julie Hickman's activities will result in a donation to the Foodkind refugees charity. Paul Lockley was unable to draw the Rollover Raffle because the winner was not present.(It



turned out to be Mike Boyce who didn't win the dosh.) So we arrived quite early at the 'speaker slot' and Crispin Reed took the floor virtually. He has spent most of his career in advertising and now sits on various boards, runs his own Skyscraper Consulting and coaches an Under 14 football team. His talk was based on his book The 7 Myths of Middle Age, starting with the Over 50 stereotype and maintaining very persuasively that the Michael Parkinson type adverts could be more sensitive. 50 year olds may well have more than 30 years ahead of them, probably have more wealth than than other groups and are not 'grumpy' but have more 'life satisfaction'. He invited us to refer to 'Socio-emotional selectivity theory', smash the stereotypes, live for the present and rage against the dying of the light (pace Dylan Thomas). We all applauded. His CAC reports that the Wolves Shirt raffle in aid of Samaritans will end at the end of January and has earned over £800 to date. It is also reported that Charles Cox has agreed to stand as President , that the idea of a glamour Centenary project has been shelved in favour of a Global Grant proposal and that The Jack Hayward Suite has

been booked for our Centenary Dinner on 20th May 2022. Mike Colley reported on the hard shift he has put in to promote The Memories Live On in place of our Tree of Remembrance – it has realised £4675.24, £1150 for each of 4 charities. We were thanked very sincerely by Peter Williams (MS Centre), Sally Woods (Compton Care) and Hayley Powell (The Haven). The Club's Charitable Trust will also receive a cheque and the assembled members applauded Mike and his helpers (including family). Sylvia Morgan reported on a positive and convivial meeting of membership Committee and Stuart Williams on a similarly good meeting of the young Citizen of the Year steering committee (see Bulletin for details). Alan and Helena Walters had a few minutes to tell us about the dire state of South Africa where she has relatives and he part owns (and runs) Cape Medical Response: 'the country has gone downhill'. People do not feel safe. Both the Walterses – he is now part of a Ludlow medical practice, feel better to be here. Many of us shared Sylvia's deep regret for that beautiful country. Mel Eves was confident that 'it will all sort itself out'.

Coronavirus etc

In late January 2021 Joe Biden is in office, signing executive orders to undo some of Trump's mischief and putting in place a strategy to deal with COVID (more than 400 000 American deaths to date). In the UK exporters are getting to grips with the new paperwork required by the EU. Vaccine injections are increasing apace (6.57m by 25th January). The NHS is up against it however ; new daily cases number more than last April, deaths each day are also higher. Is it wishful thinking that these numbers are beginning to decline? The death total is 98 531 and rising. When will the surge tail off we all wonder. Some people are apparently behaving like ostriches and refusing the vaccine! Others are holding illicit raves or weddings! The UK has the highest death rate in Europe and the government is resisting calls for loosening controls. 'Until we end the pandemic everywhere we won't defeat it anywhere'.

Past President Roger Fellows 25.9.1937-3.2.2021

Roger died at New Cross Hospital leaving behind Margaret, his wife of 50 years, his son Simon, daughter Rebecca and granddaughter Jessica. After Wolverhampton Grammar School he followed his father into Accountancy and had a very successful career with the enjoyable add-on of lecturing to Business Studies students at The Polytechnic. He was an Ironbridge Gorge Trustee, Tax Commissioner, a General Commissioner of Income Tax and ,via the Worshipful Company of Chartered Accountants, a Freeman of the City of London. (As he told us from time to time, this latter entitled him to drive sheep over London



Bridge!) He enjoyed a laugh, a lot of sports, holidays in Italy and following Wolverhampton Wanderers. He was a Round Tabler for years and a member of Bilston RC before he joined our Club. When he became President in 2015 he preferred the social and representational side to administration and his Valedictory speech remembers an excellent district conference in Llandudno, Jerry Hobbs's BEM evening, the City Remembrance Service, the Queen's 90th birthday celebration, a visit to the north-east including Durham cathedral, a jazz evening at Stableford. We will miss you Roger and send our condolences to Margaret. SW

Different types of domestic abuse are emerging ; she mentioned 'reproductive coercion' and intimidation via pets. Gemma was only able to leave with her child when a Dogs Trust

fostered Rusty. They battle on but perpetrators continue to get away with it. A Domesic Abuse Bill is reportedly on the way- but don't hold your breath! President Brian thanked her for a very good overview.

Walsall and Wolverhampton

There was a good turnout for this joint meeting on Tuesday 23rd February, the 116th birthday of Rotary – the screenshot shows about half of the audience. From her kitchen in Guernsey Jannine Birtwistle made a clarion call on behalf of Rotary Foundation with its 4 star rating from Charity Navigator. Jannine is most inspired by the Peace objective but is also RGBI's lead of the End Polio Campaign which is still striving hard (along the 1240 kilometre border between Pakistan and Afghanistan). She urged us to apply for grants, scholarships, support Vocational Training Teams and Peace Centres (e.g. the University of Bradford). (Incidentally the Polio



network is contributing greatly to the COVID response.) She was thanked for her 'inspirational presentation' and we moved onto club business, in particular preparations for our Centenary arrangements. Walsall's President will be Dr Makunda and they are planning a dinner on 1st October 2021 at Walsall Football Club, one hundred years after their first 'Interest Meeting'. Wolverhampton with President- to- be Richard Green is planning similar at the Jack Hayward Suite at Molyneux on 20th May. Led by their presidents Deep Kappoor and Brian Bailey both clubs have been holding successful meetings by zoom and raising money by adapting schemes : Walsall's Santa Sleigh morphed into Santa Letters and Wolverhampton's Tree of Remembrance became The Memories Live On. Walsall is aiming for a 'civic project' and Wolverhampton a Global Grant to mark their 100 years. Vaccine Roll-Out

More than 20m vaccinated by the end of February and Boris's position in the polls has improved. In Germany and France they seem to be rowing back on their criticism of AstraZeneca, not having been tested much on over 65s. My old friend Gerhard notes that Commission President Mrs Von der Leyen seems to have 'messed up' (vermurkst) her job of planning the vaccination campaign for the EU. They are vaccinating fast in the USA - but watch out for the return of Donald. Covax is a scheme to help the world vaccinate and it has begun by sending quantities of vaccine to Ghana. The Russian vaccine Sputnik V is achieving some prominence. The Chinese are keeping quiet about their vaccine(s).

Club Meeting and Rainforest

No visits to report on 9th February. The Small Grants Scheme has 18 applications to sift. Peter Wright failed to pick a joker and win the Rollover dosh. And then we were ready to listen to Chris Redston, chief executive of Rainforest Trust UK. The UK arm works closely with the American Rainforest Trust to protect this world asset which provides 20% of our oxygen and stores 250 billion tons of carbondioxide on 10% of world land distributed throughout the Tropics. Chris was able to retire early and devote himself to combating the damage caused by deforestation in various ways. The trust works by Land Purchase (with a local NGO partner), Land Designation (as a national park or community reserve etc) and Indigenous Land Titling (e.g. 6.1 million acres in the Amazon). Last year 148 (of the total 190) protected areas experienced less than 5% deforestation. The gains are striking in saved bird and animal species and trees. And an anonymous American philanthropist is doubling all donations. However



the climate change inducing dangers from loggers, palm oil growers and politicians in denial continue. President Brian expressed our 'thanks to a local lad'. Chris described the meeting as 'bostin'.

John Bloxham 14.2.1943 – 10.3.2021

His grown-up children Annelli, Nick and Jonty and wife of 47 years, Susan, were with him when he passed away. He had seen his 5 grandchildren in recent days. Annelli had just made it into the UK (from Spain) in January after hearing that her father's illness was worsening. Most of us were shocked and surprised to hear the sad news because he wanted to keep quiet about his condition. He was a senior Rotarian having been a member of our club since 1982, a stalwart of the Sports and Entertainment Committee and a busy organiser at many of its events. His day job had been in the motor trade, the Fiat dealer in Wolverhampton for some



years. Until recently he was undertaking driving work for Peter Posh. In his leisure hours he was very well known as a rally driver. He was in 1969 RAC National Champion, Motoring News Champion and BTRDA Gold Star Champion. He drove in the London to Mexico event in 1970, sponsored by JCB. And he was twice in the Guinness Book of Records, driving for Rotary the coast roads of Britain in the fastest time and most economically. He was a quiet and genial presence ; we will miss him greatly.
