



I would like to share with you the experience that Barbara and I had in representing you at the Drum Head Service on the steps of St. Peters on Remembrance Sunday. We have been to this solemn occasion twice before but the special significance of this, the 100th anniversary of the silencing of the guns in 1918, was indelible.

We gathered in the Civic Centre, where a large display of all the 4272 men and women of Wolverhampton, who gave their lives in the great war, so that all of us could live in peace. At 10.58 we processed to the base of the steps of St. Peters, just below the statue of Lady Wulfruna. There a large crowd had gathered in the sun-

shine. The trumpet sounded the last post and thereafter a two minute silence commenced. I noticed the unbroken observance of this silence. The rustle of the wind through the remaining leaves on the trees and the flag of



St. George on the top of St. Peters, blowing in the stiff breeze.

At the appointed time I went with Colin Hole, President of The Rotary Club of St. Georges, to lay the wreath at the Cenotaph. At times like this we reflect on the fu-

tility of war and the enormous sacrifice, not only of the combatants, but of those who were at home. All my life I have had the privilege of living in a free country and I know that is due to those who have defended that freedom. I always feel that when we say our final toast, " Rotary and Peace the World over" that it has the special meaning of hope for future generations. **President Paul**

## **Hidden Black Country Biographies**

Local historian and author Ned Williams came to the Black Country from London as an 18 year old and 'it was love at first sight'. After some work in Fairs and Circuses he began to write, about Gornal at first and then about characters like showman Pat Collins and JBT who wrote a column called Black Country Bits in the weekly The World's Fair. JBT turned out after some digging to be Joe Bate of Tipton. The research was very satisfying and the results sometimes surprised descendants of the characters who emerged. Brenda May Cuttin nee Jones was an 'aerialist (trapeze artist) without flaw' who fell 70 feet and died in the USA where she was a big star of the circus. The grand-



daughter of another hidden star thought she was related to the family of JFK but Ned had discovered that her grandad's real name was Ben Bernhardt. Ned's latest book is 'Four Swallows and two Elephants'- Bronco Bill who owned the two Wolverhampton circus elephants Salt and Sauce, was John Swallow whose son John was involved in the setting up of the Express and Star. Apart from teaching at Wulfrun College for 20 years Ned has 'been on many journeys'. We were treated to a fascinating précis.



## **Fran Bumpus**

This year's winner of the Bob Lampitt prize for the best engineering student told us her interesting story. As a girl she was interested in technology, building a radio set at 15 for example. When it came to university time she was persuaded to study history at Cambridge. History was alright and she met her husband, an archaeologist. When her second child was approaching secondary education she went back to technology and enrolled for a Wolverhampton University engineering degree in Mechatronics – she had done physics, maths and further maths at A Level. She was one of three girls in a cohort of 90 and is the first mature female engineering student of the university. We found her story interesting and she tolerated our struggle to understand Mechatronics – think of a controlling device between a power source and a motor. A worthy winner of the prize. SW

# **Club Support for Kingswood Trust**

Two grants have recently been given to the Kingswood Trust continuing our support for a local organisation that gives children a stimulating environment in which to develop and learn. A grant of £3880 was given to fund the Trust's "Hoot" project. This is an educational development for young people focussing on the creation of an environment for owls and small mammals where they can prosper and be studied. The funding will assist with the purchase of night vision binoculars, owls and mammal books and session costs for groups of children. The second grant for £602.50 comes from funds raised by a Club member and will go towards replacing equipment in order to ensure a full range of environmental activities can be undertaken. Kingswood is a long-standing education facility which became an independent trust in 2014. It provides outdoor education activities for learning with nature set in nine acres of natural environments, wildlife and resident animals. It connects children and the community to the natural world. BB





On 6<sup>th</sup> November Charlotte Kendal came to talk to us about these youngsters – there are currently 7 new cases every day. The aim is to give them 'as good a journey as possible', by bringing them together and providing experienced nursing, if possible in bespoke units of which there are currently 28 (but not yet in Wolverhampton). Aftercare is part of the desired package and the annual Royal Albert Hall show helps with fundraising. (At its last meeting Youth & Community Service agreed to send them a cheque improving on the small cheque in the photo).



## **Rotary Junior Technology Tournament**

On 26<sup>th</sup> November a group of Rotarians revisited Uplands Junior School (we were last here in July) to facilitate another tournament. All the year fives, in groups of 4, listened to Richard Green's explanations, were persuaded to prepare plans and then set about making squirrel bridges out of paper, card, clothes pegs, sellotape, elastic bands and netting – the Master Builders, the Creative Crafters, the Pink Fuzzy Unicorns etc. During the creative activity the facilitators tried to be helpful –

'can we have some more string?' etc These

events test the innovation, teamworking and problem solving abilities and, on this evidence are clearly enjoyable for the participants. Afterwards President Paul and Chair of Governors Debbie tried to pronounce first names correctly and handed out certificates to all 96 children. And then the winners Best Builders and the runnersup Wizards received their book tokens. Each Rotarian also received a surprise box of Maltesers and thought himself lucky to witness the sustained and animated team efforts. Teachers declared that the children had really enjoyed their day. ## **VSO Work in Nepal**

Lisa Stallard told us about her recent visit as a team leader to a part of rural Nepal, a country low on the international poverty scale. There are also class and gender barriers – girls cannot attend school while having their periods etc. The country is also recovering from earthquakes and regime change and combating Maoist insurgents!
